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LIFE HIGHLIGHTS – HANS CHRISTIAN ANDERSEN

1805 Hans Christian Andersen is born in Odense, Denmark, on April 2.

1819 Andersen moves to Copenhagen to seek his fortune on the stage.

1827 First poem, 'The Dying Child', published in Copenhagen Post.

1829 First book, the comic fantasy *A Walking Tour from the Holmen Canal* to the Eastern Point of the Amager, published.

1831 Andersen travels to Germany and publishes *Shadow Pictures* about his journey.

1835 First volume of *Eventyr fortalte for Born* (Fairy tales, told for Children) published on May 8.

1837 Third volume of fairy tales containing 'The Little Mermaid' and 'The Emperor's New Clothes' published.

1838 Andersen is awarded an annual grant by the King of Denmark. First translations of his fairy tales into German.

1840 *The Mulatto* performed at the Royal Theatre.

1843 *New Fairy Tales*, including 'The Ugly Duckling,' 'The Nightingale' and 'The Top and the Ball,' published.

1845 'The Little Match Girl' published.

1847 Andersen visits England and meets Charles Dickens.

1858-59 Four volumes of *New Tales and Stories*, all experimenting with new styles of story-writing and no longer intended for children, published.

1867 Anderson is awarded the "Freedom of the City of Odense."

1875 Andersen dies on August 4 in Copenhagen.

- 4. According to Alistair, what makes the cloth so unique?A: It is invisible to anyone who is unfit for their duties.
- 5. What did Captain Hughes tell Ned, when asked if he saw the cloth?A: Hughes said that it was intricate with elaborate patterns.
- 6. What does Lady Jenny suggest after "seeing" the clothes?A: That the emperor throw a parade to display his new outfit.
- 7. Why did no one want to admit they could not see the clothes?A: They were afraid they would be seen as unfit for their jobs.
- 8. Why does Ned embarrass the emperor in the middle of the parade?A: Because the Emperor did not listen to Ned when he tried to tell him the truth

before.

9. Why did the emperor send out a note to the other kingdoms, even though it would put his reputation on the line?

A: Because he needed to warn the other kingdoms about the con artists.

10. What new position is Ned given?A: Royal Truth Teller

- Andersen considered himself ugly all his life and it was this self-view that inspired "The Ugly Duckling."
- Including recently discovered and unpublished stories, Andersen wrote about 212 tales.
- Andersen's works have been translated into approximately 150 languages.
